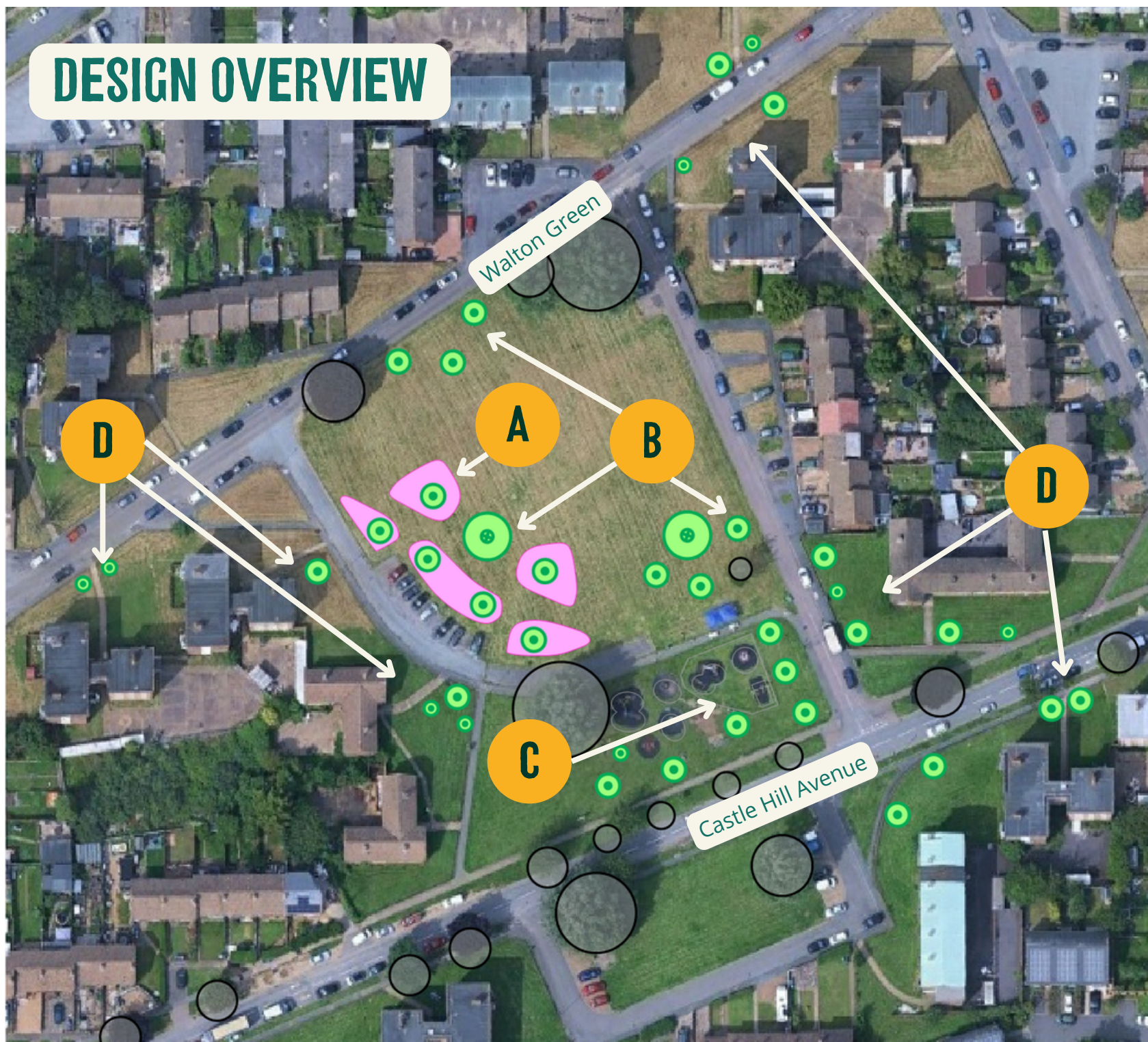


DESIGN OVERVIEW

Design with 5m wide mowing route and species selected to retain a low shrub coverage, and retain visibility.

Woodland 'bubbles'

These bubbles have been suggested to create new **shapes, textures and layers** to the open space.

They will also **support wildlife, absorb CO2, help to reduce air pollution**, and provide **year-round beauty**.

With a **medium-sized tree in the centre** of each bubble, these areas will mostly be planted with **whip species** (small trees 0.5m tall, 1-2 years old).

The whips will grow to be more shrub-like, creating **low screening** which will still keep **clear sight lines** across the space.

Each bubble would be spaced **5 metres apart** so that maintenance and watering can be carried out.

Statement trees

We are suggesting planting **eight trees that will grow to be the biggest in the space**. The trees will be much smaller when newly planted. Trees take many years to grow and can grow very differently depending on local environmental conditions.

Additional **heat adaptation** is also a priority for the park, and these trees will create **shade** and **cooler**, more **comfortable spaces** to spend time in hot, dry summers.

The **Holm oak** and **Scots pine** have **dense, evergreen canopies** which stay colourful during winter when other trees lose their leaves. The **Norway maple** has bright autumn colours. They all provide **important protection for wildlife**.

Children's play area

Shade is also important near **high use spaces** like the children's play area.

The trees we suggest planting here - the **Field maple** and **Honey locust tree** - would grow to be **medium sized**, with **interesting leaf shapes** and **bright seasonal colours**.

Estate green verges

Shade and cooling has also been considered near footpaths on the edges of **Walton Green Estate** and **Castle Hill Avenue Estate**.

We have suggested smaller and medium sized trees like **Wild Service tree**, **Crab apple** and **Hawthorn**.

All trees will be planted at least **7 metres from any building**, so that their root systems do not spread under housing.

Standard trees are at least 1.8m tall and 8-12 years old when planted. All of these tree species are suggested because they are climate resilient, and can tolerate the dry soil and wind exposure of the green spaces.

Whips are around 0.5m and 1-2 years old when planted. We will plant 1000 of these whips in total, with an equal mix of all species.

All of these tree species are suggested because they are climate resilient, and can tolerate the dry soil and wind exposure of the green spaces.
